3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility.

- Seven Rovers and three Rangers of the college participated in the Adventure Summer Camp at Kokrajhar from 14.07.2016 to 18.07.2016. Yakub Mondal and Rashmita Barman got 1st Prizes in Quiz Competition and Folk Dance respectively. Besides that seven other Rovers and Rangers also won prizes in different events.
- Two Rangers and a Leader Dr. P. G. Agarwala attended the Workshop on World Association of Girls Guide and Girls Scout & Free Being Me from 26.07.2016 to 30.07.2016 at Shillong.
- The Rovers of the College Rituparna Sarma, Ratan Kumar Roy and Ali Rahosan received the Rastrapati Award on 12th Aug, 2016 from Sri Pranab Mukharjee, the Hon'ble President of India.
- Librarian's Day was observed in the College Library on 12.08.2016 to inculcate the values and benefits of Library use among the students and faculty of the college. Speaking on the occasion, Librarian Ms. Rita Malakar urges upon the audience that the proper use of library and its facilities can help use the users in searching their materials. Principal Dr. R. P. Singh and the IQAC, Coordinator Dr. G. K. Saha also spoke on the occasion. An Essay Competition on the "Role of Library in Increasing Reading Habits" was organized and prizes were distributed.
- Seven Rangers, one Rover and one Leader attended the State Level Rajya Puraskar Testing Camp at STC, Chamatapathar, Assam from 03.09.2016 to 07.09.2016.
- Five Rovers and Eight Rangers of Sapatgram College were awarded the Rajya Purashkar from 07.09.2016 to 10.09.2016 by Sri Banwarilal Purohit, the Hon'ble Governor of Assam.
- An Awareness Programme was organized by Value Based Education Cell in Deshbandhu Smriti Vidyapith Girls' High School on 15th October, 2016 on Global Hand Washing Day. In the programme the students of the school were advised to wash their hands with soap and the technique of hand washing was also taught to them.
- The teachers and students of the college under the initiative of the Extension Education Cell of the college actively participated in Swachha Bharat Abhiyan (Cleanliness Programme) organized by the Women Cell as per the instruction of the Civil Administration, Bilasipara on 22.10.16. The cleanliness activity was performed at various places of Sapatgram Town. The students and teachers were actively involved in the cleaning of Kachari area, Market Area, Bus Stand and

- Railway Station. The college was awarded the best prize by the Civil Administration in the sub-division.
- A Special Talk on "Ayurveda: Its Relevance in Our Life" was organized in the college on 28.10.2016, the Ayurveda Day. Dr.Himanta Nath delivered a lecture on the topic as Keynote speaker. Dr. R. P. Singh, Principal chaired the session. The other speakers were Dr. G. K. Saha, Coordinator, IQAC, Mr. N. I. Mondal and Mr. S.K.Panigrahi.
- Rashtriya Ekta Saptah was organized in the college campus from 31.10.2016 to 06.11.2016. A Rally for Peace and Communal Harmony was organized and it covered the town and the adjoining villages with placards and slogans on communal harmony.
- Thinking Day was observed in Sapatgram College on 22nd February, 2017, the birth anniversary of Lord Stephen Baden Powell and his wife Lady Baden Powell. A Lecture Session on the contribution of Lord Baden Powell was also held. It was organized by Value Based Education Cell of the college
- International Women's Day was observed on 8th March, 2017 organized by Women Cell, Sapatgram College in the college campus. An Art Competition of school and college students was held on the day. A rally of the girl students and members of Yeikya Mancha was organized through the town and adjoining villages. Street plays about the rights of women were performed by the students.
- Rabindra Jayanti was observed on 9th May, 2017. The Principal and the teachers of the Department of Bengali spoke on the contribution of Rabindranath Tagore towards Indian Literature. More than 200 students and teachers participated in the Programme.
- World Environment Day was observed by Extension Education Cell, Sapatgram College on 5th June, 2017 with a day-long programme. There was plantation programme in the college campus and in the adjoining villages. A rally of the students was also organized that ran down the town area with placards for inculcating awareness in the public about environmental pollution and its degradation. Street plays were also performed by the students for the same purpose. The general public was advised to ban plastic in their day-to-day life.
- International Yoga Day was observed in the college by the Value Based Education Cell on 21st June, 2017 in the Indoor Stadium. More than 100 students participated in the programme. Dr. P. G. Agrawala, Mr. N. I. Mondal spoke on the value and benefits of yoga and advised the students to make it a part of their daily life. Mr. A. Das demonstrated some yoga postures and the students performed them accordingly. It was also decided that the Value Based Education Cell will organize yoga classes every Sunday in the college campus.

- 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
 - 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college follows the curriculum prescribed by Gauhati University. Hence, there is no scope for innovation in curricular design. But in the field of curriculum transaction, new measures were adopted so as to make the process of teaching learning more adequate, absorbing, knowledge oriented and socially directed. The following measures were adopted.

- The Head of the Departments distributed the major and general course syllabi among the teachers including the guest faculties.
- The teachers prepared their lesson planning according to the class routine allotted to them and the lesson plan was executed. If any class was suspended due to some unavoidable circumstance, the class was re-organized by the concerned teacher on other teaching days to make up the loss.
- Weekly Seminar classes were held for the students of Major Courses where students were encouraged to present papers prepared under the active guidance of the teachers.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Staff members prepare a teaching plan at the beginning of every semester. This plan is based on the teaching days available for class instruction. The syllabus framed by each faculty is reviewed by the Head of Department at the end of every quarter. Principal reviews the teaching plan along with student's attendance reports at the end of each quarter.
- Guest lecturers are invited to share their knowledge among the students as when needed.
- Continued the mentoring system during the session 2014-15. It is believed that by introduction of the mentoring system, the problems faced by the students in teaching-learning and other activities has been partially addressed.
- Interactive sessions were organized by conducting group discussion, quiz etc.
- Continued the practice of organizing weekly departmental seminars for students in order to enable them to interact among themselves and with the teachers.
- Continued the practice of giving home assignments to the students as part of their internal assessment.
- Library services are improved with the facility of computerization of library.
- Facility of computer and internet access and training to teachers, non-teaching staff and students are provided.
- Encouraged the faculty members to present papers in National/ International Seminars/ Conferences/ Workshops, to take up Minor/ Major Research Projects under UGC Scheme, to avail the benefit of Faculty Improvement Programme under UGC for research work and to publish papers in ISSN/ ISBN Journals/ Books.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The final examinations are conducted as per the directives of Gauhati University. However, internal examinations are conducted by the college. 20% marks are assigned for the internal examinations. It is scored on the basis of written examinations, papers presentation in the Weekly Seminars and home assignments in Major Papers. However, in case of General Course the students are supposed to take up written examination of 20% as internal marks.









The Best Practice -1 Title: Library Best User Award

Goal:

Practice: Data is gathered through visitor's register which is maintained by the librarian. Data is compiled on the basis of circulatory register. The best user award is given on the basis of data analysis and the observatory note of the librarian. Two students are selected for this award. This award is given in the form of appreciation certificate on the librarian's day on 12th August. Library users are appreciated for their efforts in keeping the entrance, reading and stalk areas neat and clean.

Evidence of success:

- 1. Visitors of library increased.
- 2. Increase in the use of library resources.
- 3. Improved the quality of students.

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4. Positive attitude towards the value of library and its services are seen among the students.

Problems Encountered and Resource required:

- 1. Library service has not been provided systematically due to insufficient staff and space.
- 2. Reading rooms are not up to the mark to fulfill the demands of the visitors.
- 3. ICT enabled services in library are not properly maintained due to poor network connectivity and inadequate ICT equipments.
- 4. Lack of sufficient trained staff.
- 5. Regular reading habit is yet to be generated.
- 6. Widely accessible computer network and adequate ICT equipments required for proper dissemination.

Goal:

- 2. To provide school student a conducive environment of learning.
- 3. To bridge the gap of inadequate teachers by providing college teachers for the same in certain subjects.
- 4. To empower the students acquire sufficient knowledge with the help of resources available in the college
- 5. To equip the teachers of the school by knowledge sharing.

Context:

The mission to adopt a backward LP School located in the village Silghagri under Kadamtala GP, Mahamaya Block was formally initiated in the year 2014-15 as a part of community development programme. Keeping the mission in mind, the college decided to adopt Lokpriya High school located at Rabantari village under Mahamaya block.

The village Ravantari is a mediocre village located in Bilasipara subdivision of Dhubri, Assam with a lower literacy rate 67.3 compared to 72.19% of Assam. Keeping in view the various needs of the school, Sapatgram College adopted the school through the initiative of Extension Education Cell of the college.

Though it is a newly provincialized school partly funded by the government of Assam, it lacks basic facilities, insufficient infrastructure and inadequate teachers. Therefore, the college after signing a memorandum of understanding with the school authority initiated to assist the school free teaching in certain subjects and other basic things.

Practices:

The adopted school programme encourages students not only by providing support to build academic skills but also to build self esteem and confidence. Meanwhile, our college provided two Ceiling fans, a steel almirah and a tube well for fulfilling the basic needs of the school. Plantation of trees in the school has been done on the "World Environmental Day". English department of the college initiated a supplementing study through ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROGRAMME. The college also provided support in sports, yoga, health and environmental awareness. The teachers also imparted teaching in English, Assamese, and Mathematics.

Evidence of Success:

- 1. It is evident from the fact that our college has succeeded in motivating the teachers and the taught towards qualitative improvement of the school.
- 2. The college looked into various needs of the schools and created a congenial atmosphere in order to create teaching-learning conditions.
- 3. A little amount of success is also visible in creating literacy awareness that generated increase in the enrollment.
